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16 Chopper Pilots Support 10,000 Square Mile Area

The 5th Bombardment Wing (Heavy) helicopter operation section supports the 91st Strategic Missile Wing by transporting missile combat crews, maintenance personnel, security police and supplies to the missile launch facilities (LFs) and launch control facilities (LCEs)

The section supports 150 LFs and 150 LCFs of the 91st SMW encompassing 10,000 square

miles.

Seven UH-1F "Iroquois" helicopters are assigned to carry out this unique mission. The UH-1F carries up to nine passengers in addition to two pilots plus up to 400 pounds of baggage.

Of the 16 pilots in the section, seven are Vietnam veterans. During a typical week, they fly over 60 missions and are on alert seven days a week but do not fly any alert exercises.

The pilots receive their initial "chopper" training at Sheppard AFB, Tex., where they get 140 hours of flight training. Upon their arrival here they receive an additional 20 hours of actual flying.

Besides this, they fly another 200 hours to get certified as passenger qualified.

The helicopter operation sec-

tion came into the bomb wing in January 1968. Before the unit was attached to the 862nd Combat Support Group.

Since it began to support the missile wing in the latter part of 1965, it has flown approximately 27,167 hours and had only one major accident.

In August 1967, the "birds" and their crews engaged in forest fire fighting in Montana and Idaho, getting Air Medals for their aerial feats.

Another unique aspect of the section is its flying range, 700 feet to a mile, the lowest-view flying range minimum of any aircraft in the Strategic Air Command.
